Director's Notes

Quartet, recently adapted as a film, was first performed at the Yvonne Arnaud Theatre in Guildford prior to its West End opening at the Albery Theatre (now the Noël Coward Theatre) on 8 September 1999. And what a cast it had - the late Sir Donald Sinden, Alec McCowen, Stephanie Cole and Angela Thorne. The film too had a stellar cast – Dame Maggie Smith, Pauline Collins, Tom Courtenay and Billy Connolly!

The setting for our story is Beecham House, a retirement home for musicians and, when the play opens, three elderly former opera-singers, Reggie, Wilfred and Cissy, who often worked together, are sitting out on the terrace, enjoying the summer sunshine. Their peaceful life, however, is about to be disrupted by the arrival of a former colleague, Jean, a major star in her day, to whom Reggie was once unhappily married - and no-one has thought to warn Reggie that his ex-wife is about to become a fellow resident. Given this troubled history, is there any chance that these four will ever be able to resume their friendship, let alone sing together again at the forthcoming Gala Concert to celebrate Verdi's birthday? You'll soon find out!

As Reggie says in the play, Art is meaningless if it does not make you feel." Following this play's premiere, one London reviewer described it as "an unashamed — no, shameless — vehicle for four feisty old troupers whose task is to make us laugh a little, sigh a little and cry a little as they take us into the bittersweet world of facing up to age and mortality." Whether my cast would describe themselves as "feisty old troupers" I dare not ask, but one thing I do know: you'll enjoy their performances!
